Steady Progress in Siem Reap Rural Ed Programs



English Conversation in Small Groups

From April to June, we continued our English and Computer classes, from Monday through Friday in 2 large rural primary schools in Siem Reap.

Our program covers the teachers' monthly salaries, the electricity bill, a stipend for materials and computer upkeep, and salary for security guards.

375 provincial students are enrolled in English and computer classes 5 days per week. The programs are open to all students from 3rd to 6th grade; ages 8-12. These programs give a much needed boost to rural children who are often at a disadvantage when it comes to moving on to higher learning or finding good jobs. English language and IT skills are usually required for both.

We celebrated the Khmer New Year with a trip to the water park, followed by a barbecue dinner at our home, including movie and popcorn! During school holidays and in the evenings, Mr. Thy has been giving the girls regular tutoring in math. Most of the girls come to us with serious gaps in their education and need help to catch up to their grade levels. Math is a big challenge! We are happy to report that as of last month, ALL of our girls have mastered their times tables from 1 to 9! That's a huge win and they all felt so proud of their achievement. As a special treat, we took everyone to a petting farm in the countryside. The girls got to see ostrich, sheep, goats, rabbits, cows and pigs, cats and dogs. We could enter most cages to feed and pet the animals. We brought a picnic lunch and had a fabulous time!



Meet our faithful housemothers, Chairuen and Sreyoun. Sreyoun has been with us from the start and Chairuen recently joined our team. They oversee all of the girls 24/7 and share the cooking, cleaning and laundry. We've built a new water storage tank that can harvest up to 100,000 litres of rainwater. Our vegetable gardens now have morning glory, okra, long beans, egg plants and guavas ready to

eat! The more water we can save & food we grow, the less we have to buy! And our lovely girls really look forward to their weekly creative art classes. They sing together, do art projects, and play all kinds of fun games. It's a beautiful time of bonding and building resilience. ***"We should hear a little music, read a little poetry, and see a fine picture every day of life, to sense the beauty which God has put in the human soul."***



Gathering for Peace

In April, Ann and Thida were invited to attend an Easter gathering for Peace at Banteay Meanchey province; a remote province along the Thai border. It was hosted by the Department of Christian Churches and held at a Korean university.

About 30 pastors were invited and we, the only women among them, were asked to represent our province of Kampong Speu. An advisor to the Prime Minister was the guest of honor and led the event for about 1000 people. There were choirs from many different provinces, people leading prayers, children's skits and youth performances. We united in prayer for peace and safety for those affected by the ongoing border crisis and for all of the displaced persons who've had to leave their villages and seek refuge in camps. Native believers from all over the country travelled far to come together and pray for peace. It was a powerful act of humbling ourselves before the Lord and looking to Him to save and protect and raise a standard against violence and war.



Building Up our Local Community

This quarter we began visiting a nearby village bi-monthly to share classes with leaders and elders on character and leadership qualities, finances, forgiveness, taking action and more. These people are key influencers in their



communities and are eager to grow and develop themselves and to find workable solutions to the problems they face. We also taught monthly classes for the farmers in the area who are applying for overseas work positions in Korea. It's a big move and they appreciate all the preparation they can get!
